Women and the Vote 1893 Petition

- The main suffrage petition was submitted to Parliament on 28 July 1893.
- It contains the names and addresses of about 24,000 women aged 21 years or older.
- The original petition comprised more than 500 individual sheets, which were signed in various parts of the country.
- These were glued together to form a single roll that stretched more than 270m



Within 10 weeks the law was changed and women could legally vote.

A staggering 109,461 women exercised their hard won right in the 1893 elections.

An amazing achievement for New Zealand and an international first for universal suffrage.

Lets do the math

The population of New Zealand in 1893 was 714,300 people.

1. What percentage of people signed the petition?

Formula = 24,000/714,300 X 100/1

- 2. The petition was 270m long made from 500 sheets of paper. How long was each sheet ? m or cm
- 3. Estimate the average number of signatures on each page?
- 4. The final length of the petition was closest in length to a) a rugby field, b) a quarter of a kilometre, or c) the width of a road?
